## Weekly Overview:

As Noah emerges from the ark, he steps into the world with not only a promise from God, but instruction from God. The instruction for Noah to "be fruitful and multiply" is one of the most common phrases in the whole bible. But what does it mean? And who is the instruction for? Was it for just Noah? Or does the instruction apply to us today too? In this message we will explore the theological understanding of "be fruitful and multiply" and how it relates to the great commission mandate that came from Jesus thousands of years later.
